PRESIDENT-ELECT BIOGRAPHY

Larry Mitzner

Larry graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1964 with a B.S. degree in fish and wildlife biology. Larry started his professional career with the Iowa Conservation Commission in 1966 as a fisheries biologist II at the Lake Macbride Station. In 1971 he transferred to the Chariton Research Station and is currently employed by the DNR at that position.

Larry has been a member of the Iowa Chapter AFS since 1969. During that time he has served as President-elect President (1972-73) and Secretary-Treasurer (1980-81)for the Chapter. Larry is currently the co-chairman of the North Central Division Publications Committee and associate editor of the North American Journal of Fisheries Management. Larry is a member of the AFS management section and the Institute of Fishery Research American Biologists.

Larry received the Iowa Conservation Commission outstanding fisheries employee award in 1971, and best paper award at the 1980 Midwest Fish and Wildlife Conference and the 1988 Iowa Chapter Meeting. He is a certified fisheries scientist.

Bernie Schonhoff

Bernie holds a B.S. degree (1978) and M.S. degree (1980) from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in Fisheries Science. He was employed by Cornell University, New York from 1980 to 1985 as a Research Support Specialist. During that time he worked on largemouth bass population dynamics, size limits, and fingerling walleye stockings. In 1985 Bernie was hired by the Iowa DNR as a fisheries management biologist and is currently located on the Mississippi River at Fairport.

Bernie has been a member of the Missouri, New York and the Iowa Chapters AFS. He is also a member of the management and computer user sections of AFS, and is a certified fisheries scientist.

SECRETARY-TREASURER BIOGRAPHY

Jerry Hudson

Jerry graduated from Kansas State University in 1974 with a B.S. degree in fisheries

biology. He started work with the Iowa Conservation Commission in 1975 as a worker at Cold Springs. In 1976 he was promoted to a fisheries management technician at Lake View and later promoted to management biologist. Jerry has been a DNR biologist for the past seven years at the Manchester Station. In 1977, he was named the Iowa Conservation Commission outstanding fisheries employee. Jerry is a certified fisheries scientist.

Martin Konrad

Martin is a 1975 Iowa State University graduate with a B.S. degree in fish and wildlife biology. He has been employed with the Department of Natural Resources since 1977. During his years with the Fisheries Bureau he spent one year at the Chariton Research Station as a worker, seven years at Mt. Ayr and Rathbun as a management technician, and the past three years in Des Moines as an executive assistant.



THE IOWA SCENE

Brushy Creek Lake

Much controversy has been generated by Iowa DNR's proposal to construct a 690 acre lake on the 4,200 acre Brushy Creek Recreation Area in Webster County. The DNR has awarded a final engineering design contract for the dam using approximately \$200 thousand of lottery money. Funding for construction of this high quality lake is in limbo because of opposition in the Senate. Members are urged to contact their respective Senators, and to encourage other lake supporters to do the same.

Streams Technical Committee

effort to facilitate the proper management of cool, warm, and coldwater streams in the Midwest, the North Central Division has established a Streams Technical Committee. The primary goal of this committee is to organize and disseminate information relating to streams and to promote useful and timely research which will address stream related problems and opportunities. To facilitate a high level of participation by a large membership, a representative from each NCD chapter has been selected to sit on a core committee. Vaughn Paragamian is coordinating representative for the Iowa Chapter.

Walleye Technical Committee

The second annual meeting of the NCD Walleye Technical Committee was held December 6, 1987, with 51 attendees. The mission of the group is to promote research and development of functional management strategies leading to the wise use of native and introduced stocks of walleye, and their sauger, hybrids, to improve culture techniques, and to facilitate the dissemination of pertinent data and technology to both the scientific and user communities. The next committee meeting is in Columbus, Ohio during the Midwest and will focus on fry vs. fingerling stocking programs. Dick McWilliams is co-chair of the committee with Bill Franzin of Manitoba.



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
Overseas sales of fisheries products reached a record \$1.66 billion in 1987--up 22% over 1986--according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The volume of catch rose to a record 525,000 metric tons, up 13% from 1986. The country's biggest foreign fish buyer, Japan, bought fish and fishery products worth a record \$1.074 billion in 1987. Also in 1987, seafood imports rose by \$800 million to a record \$5.6 billion. Part of the reason for the trade deficit is that the U.S. fishing industry cannot fully supply America's growing taste for high-priced seafood.
